STATEMENT ON H. RAP BROWN

We, the undersigned organizations and individuals, call upon all Americans who believe in the Constitution of the United States to defend the right of free speech now being denied to H. Rap Brown, Chairman of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee. Specifically, we demand that Attorney General Ramsey Clark stop the present persecution of Mr. Brown and secure his immediate release from prison.

Rap Brown is presently imprisioned by the federal government in ouisians under bonds totalling \$65,000 and, when Louisians is through with him, must be returned to Virginia to be held there without bond until he is turned over to authorities in Cambridge, Md., where bond of \$50,000 has already been demanded. Regardless of the complicated legal issues of his case, two facts are indisputable and unchallenged:

I. Mr. Brown, although he now faces criminal charges in two states, has not been tried on or found guilty of any of them. His imprisonment now, under exorbitant bonds, is a clear violation of the age-old principle that a man is presumed innocent until proven guilty, as well as the "excessive bail" provision of the Eigth

Amendment to our Constitution.

2. His present imprisonment came about because he made a trip to California from New York City and made two speeches there. The government claims this violated the terms of a previous bond which had restricted him to the Southern District of New York. Brown's attorneys claim that his trip to California was to confer with them, which was allowed by the court in its travel restrictions. Regardless of who finally wins that argument in the courts, it is significant that there is not an implication that Brown was trying to escape the jurisdiction of the courts, that he had ever failed to appear when required to do so by any court, or that he had any intention of failing to do so. Under our constitutional system, there is only one purpose of a bond: to insure the appearance of a defendant when required.

Thus, the conclusion is inescapable that the government is making a special case of Rap Brown - that it wants to keep him in jail although he has been convicted of no crime, that it wants to keep him from speaking, and that it has violated the most basic tenents of our Bill of

Rights to accomplish this.

This nation's black citizens are engry and have served notice that they will no longer tolerate the conditions under which they have lived for so long. The President's Commission on Civil Disorders, in its historic report, has stated clearly that recent uprisings in our city ghettos have occured because of the racism of white America and the conditions under which ghetto residents live. Yet, despite the conclusions of the government's own commission, Mr. Brown's imprisonment coupled with recent arrest of other militant black spokesmen - gives notice that certain powerful forces in our government have made a decision to try to cope with urban unrest not by programs to improve people's lives but by the police power of the state - by jailing of some militant leaders and the intimidation of others.

Such a decision affects the future of us all. We who sign this statement are dedicated to correcting social injustice and building a better society. Our methods of work and programs differ. Some of us would agree with positions taken by Rap Brown, while others would not. But all of us agree profoundly that we have a vital stake in ending the

persecution of this man.

As people in organizations committed to social change, we believe the goals we work for are crucially threatened when our government makes a decision to cope with social problems by using its police power to jail its critics and crush its dissenters. We do notwant to live in

a country that handles its problems in this way.

Furthermore, as critics and dissenters ourselves, each of us knows that if one group of dissenters is silenced, no one is safe. Especially those of us who are white know that if the government jails and silences and crushes militant black spokesmen, it is only a matter of time until white critics of governmental policies will be treated in much the same

If there is anything that history teaches us, it is that those who sit silent while another's rights are violated inevitably come to one of two sad ends: either they ultimately compromise their own priciples to survive in a police state, or they are eventually crushed themselves when it is too late to resist. Those who would protect their own freedom must do so by making their stand each day at that point where the present brunt of the attack is. Today the brunt of the attack on freedom in America is Rap Brown. We take our stand in resistance to the We are convinced that at this moment our own attack on his rights. future hangs on his fate.

We most urgently call on our fellow Americans who value their own

freedom to join us in this resistance.
