You must go down to the registrar's office and register: any strenuous hours, days, months, and years have been put in by both black and white

President Johnson signed the Voting Bill on August 8, 1965 which will do away with the difficult and irrelevent test that was required in order to register to vote.

There is no longer any excuse for not registering to vote. In order to increase the number of those who register, a system of ambassadors and The ambasscaptains is being set-up. adors are members of the Steering Committee of the Padison Parish Cet Registered and Voters League. They vill have captains under them. These aptains will be responsible for helpthe people in thier areas get registred, and these captains will report ivery weekend to their ambassador. hen the Steering Committee meets very Monday, the ambassadors will eport how many people they and their captains have registered in their ireas.
