THE VOTING RIGHTS ACT IS UNDER ATTACK

The U.S. Supreme Court will hear oral arguments in a Shelby County, Alabama case challenging the Constitutionality of Section 5, the teeth of the Voting Rights Act.

The only black elected official in Shelby County, Alabama was unelected when district lines were redrawn without preclearance required by section 5 of the Voting Rights Act. Never forget the violence and trickery that was used to take away our right to vote for 100 years. What happened in Shelby County can happen anywhere if Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act is struck down.

If the Supreme Court strikes down Section 5, states will be able to redraw districts without Justice Department approval. Black and other people of color will become nonexistent in elected office.
