Your fight for democracy is definitely in the strong tradition that grounded SNCC and others working for social justice in America. As you know, like you, the late Julian Bond, a SNCC veteran, was expelled from the Georgia legislature in 1966 in an attempt to undermine the will of his constituents. He was denied his seat because he refused to be intimidated by the white members of the Georgia legislature. Instead, he continued to support SNCC's statement against the unjust war in Vietnam. Like you, he was voted in again. However, after the state legislature refused to seat him a second time, he was, finally, returned to his seat through a unanimous U.S. Supreme Court decision. The expulsion made Julian a national figure who continued to battle for the human and civil rights of all Americans throughout his life.
