
~~I, Carl Young, being duly sworn, depose, and say, to wit:~~

I, Wayne Yancey, 21 years of age, a graduate of Colley Vocational School, a resident of Chicago, Illinois, witnessed an incident at Fitch's Texaco Station on North Memphis Street, Holly Springs, Mississippi, at approximately 8:05 PM on Tuesday, June 30, 1964.

I was in a group with Larry Rubin, Peter Cummings, and several others when this big white man at the service station threatened us by pretending to throw a bottle at us and by saying, "I should throw this bottle right through you!" He said other things, not very polite, but the most threatening statement was "I'm going to take this twelve-gauge shotgun and shoot all of you sons of bitches away!" He grabbed Rubin's collar with his hand.


I, Johnny Jackson, 18 years of age, a student of Rust College, a resident of Louisville, Mississippi witnessed an incident at the Texaco Service Station on Memphis Avenue 75 yards from Rust College, Holly Springs at approximately 8:30 p.m. on Tuesday, June 30, 1964.

I had gone to get a soda pop from Parker's Cafe, on Memphis Avenue and was returning to college. As I was passing the Texaco Service Station about 8:30 p.m. I saw a white man pushing a colored man on his chest. The white man was about 210 pounds and six feet four inches in height. The colored man was about 50 years old. He was pushing the old man and cursing at him. When he saw me he came toward me and cursed something unintelligible (I couldn't understand what he said) at me.

He asked me what I was doing with the pop bottle and I mumbled something like, "What the hell!" and I walked away. I never saw the old man before and I don't know who he is. I don't know who else saw the incident, I was alone and what I witnessed was the last half of the incident.

I, Walter Evans, went to the Marshall County Courthouse, in Holly Springs, Mississippi, in order to vote in the Democratic Primary Convention, and to submit an authorization from Mrs. Victoria Gray, a candidate from the Freedom Democratic Party, to be a poll-watcher,

I went down about twenty minutes to four, on June 2, 1964. I went in, and a woman, who appeared to be in charge of the voting place, asked me if I wanted to vote. I said yes. They looked my name up in the book of registered voters, and located my name. I then signed in another book.

I was given a ballot, and directed to go to an enclosure, to vote. I voted, folded my ballot, and placed it in the ballot box on a table.

I had given the authorization form to the women prior to going in to vote. At that time, nothing was said.

After I voted, I was given the request back, and told that it was to be given to the circuit clerk's office. I went to that office. I talked to the circuit clerk, Mr. Otis Clayton. He said, "This is not my election." He said that I would have to see the person from the Democratic Party who was in charge of the primary. He never made clear exactly which ~~my~~ Party official he was referring to.

I could not locate the man I was told to see, so I left. At no time was I asked for poll tax receipts.

Being duly sworn deposes and says: to-wit: I am a citizen of the United States of America and am a Negro or a white participant in civil rights and desegregation work. On (day) Feb. 8, (month) _____, (date) _____, 1964, at about 12^{am} time, the following happened:

I was driving a 1957 Ford, owned by Mr. E. Parker who lives on College Street in Holly Springs,

I was parked on the right hand side of Memphis Street, in front of Parker's Cafe. I pulled out, and was standing diagonally across the right lane, looking both ways. A car approached from the south the ~~North~~ direction, and in order to avoid him hitting me, I sped across the white line, and stood across the other lane. A car then approached from the north, and almost hit me again.

I was stopped by a highway patrol car, and given a ticket for reckless driving. I pleaded guilty, on ~~July 10~~ February 10, and was fined \$10. Eight dollars was for the fine, plus \$2 costs.
