ederal aid to hospitals

Under provisions of the Hill-Burton Act, which allows federal grants for the construction of health facilities, one grant has been made in Lownder County, to the Lowndes County Health Clinic in Hayneville, for the emount of \$69,828 of which \$46,552 was paid by the federal government, The grant was approved in February, 1960. The Health Chinic is ounded by Lowndes County. The Hill-Burton Act forbids the practice of racial segregation in facilities constructed with money granted under its provisions.

industrial espansic during 1964

Ben River Mills of Danville, Vac, has recently completed a plant valued at \$10,000,000, which will manufacture "sheeting fabrics" and employ about 200 paoples If these employees are paid the average wage for textile workers in Alabama (\$65 a week), their payroll will be \$650,000 a year. Brance Weed Products will build a wood chipping plant in Ft. Deposit valued at \$250,000 which will employ ten people.
