I knowthat many of you probably get requests and questions about the need for food and clothing. The problem has never been the need but rather shipping, shipping costs and distribution. Shipping to a central place is possibly the worst way to approach the proble, therefore, <u>please</u> check with me about location, needs, and names and addresses of local contacts where thing should be sent.

MFUL NEEDS HELP IN FORM OF MONEY, FOOD AND CLOTHING In Mississippi more than 850 people are on strike during this cotton picking season. As the winter gets colder, food and fuel and shelter get scarcer for Negroes all over the South, For those on strike in the Delta this winter will be severe. Here is a letter from one of For those on strike in the MFLU members:

Bear Sir:

In the Nississippi Delta there is more cotton grown than any other part of America. There has been no minimum wage law established in regarding fame labor, especially in the Mississsippi Delta in a small town named Shaw, Miss.

These people feel very strongly about doing something regarding the wages they are getting for chopping cotton \$2.50 to \$3.50 for ten hours a day. So in May, 1965, a group of people who have been working in Civil Rights moment decided that they would form a labor union. They called all the cotton choppers, truck drivers together to ask them if they would be willing to jion the union and go on statrike for higher wages. strike for higher wages.

The Mississippi Fleedom Labor Union has approximately 886 members on strike in five cities in the state; their demands are basic; \$1.25 minimum per hour, an eight hour day with and a half oevertime, sick pay, health and a ccident insurance and equal employment prac-tices in wages, hering and working conditions.

The cities involved are: Tribbett, 438 strikers; Cleveland, 150; Shaw 230; Sidon, 3; and Rosedale, 115. Since working in the cot-ton fields is the chief source of income for Pegroes in these areas in the summer and fall of the year, the striking members are in need of moeny, food and clothing. Therefore, we will need the support of our many friends in the North who are deeply concerned with the wares problem who are confronted with what we need most which is wages problem who are confronted with what we seed most which is money, but food and clothing are also needed for the strikers and their families.
