

NO AID AND COMFORT for the C.I.A.

The Central Intelligence Agency is going to be recruiting here next Monday and Tuesday (Nov. 6&7). The list of C.I.A. activities--those which have come to light--is long and bloody: massacre in Indonesia, overthrow of the Goulart regime in Brazil, engineering of the Bay of Pigs invasion of Cuba, backing counterrevolution in Guatemala in 1954, and guiding the U.S. involvement in Vietnam in the 1950's and early '60's. At home and abroad the C.I.A. has infiltrated labor unions, student groups, and various international cultural and educational organizations. In short the C.I.A. is the undercover arm of the U.S. government which carries out its oppressive programs through espionage, sabotage, and subversion.

ANTI-WAR PROTESTS ESCALATE

The C.I.A. and other war recruiters have been getting a hard time at campuses around the country this year. The C.I.A. has been stopped at Columbia. Dow Chemical was pushed off the campus by students at Harvard, Williams, and the University of Wisconsin's students pushed into the recruiting room until the interviewers left. At Oberlin, a car containing a Navy recruiter was surrounded by students, until eventually teargas was used to disperse them. At Fordham and San Jose, students picketing against marine recruiters were attacked by cops. At Princeton cops broke up a picket of students attacking the university's complicity with the Institute for Defense Analysis (IDA), an agency with which Berkeley also has intimate connections. At Brooklyn College, a strike resulted when cops arrested 43 students for trying to set up an SDS table next to a Navy recruiter. The strike was 90% effective and the students won all their demands: no more Navy recruiters on campus, all suspended students re-instated, and no more cops on campus. These demonstrations together with Stop the Draft Week show that the student movement can, even in the face of police power, make an effective protest against the war.

FREE CHOICE?

It may be said that if we kick the C.I.A. representative off campus, it will both obstruct his freedom to interview and students' freedom of choice. We do not think that freedom for the C.I.A. is the issue. The issue is freedom for the American, Vietnamese, and the world's people who are oppressed by the C.I.A. The purpose of the C.I.A. is action, not talk, repression, not freedom. We are concerned with the action the C.I.A. takes every day of the week.

It is also said that the C.I.A. should have just as much right to talk and to recruit as does SDS and other campus organizations. Certainly, we can talk all we want. It is when we organize, it is when we take action, that the university and the government attack us. This is exactly what FSM taught us about Civil Rights, and what a court injunction and cops taught us about Stop the Draft Week. We have the freedom to talk, but not to act.

The C.I.A. has freedom to act as well as talk. It has the freedom to murder and commit any crimes without any regulation by the American people. The only rule that it recognizes is the furtherment of the "national interest!"

WE BELIEVE THAT THE C.I.A. HAS NO RIGHT TO CONTINUE ITS ILLEGAL AND IMMORAL ACTIVITIES. AND WITH SUCH ACTIVITIES AS ITS EVERYDAY FUNCTION, IT CERTAINLY HAS NO RIGHT TO RECRUIT ON THIS CAMPUS. WE FEEL THAT THE C.I.A. REPRESENTATIVE SHOULD BE ESCORTED OFF THIS CAMPUS ON MONDAY, AND BE TOLD THAT NEITHER HE NOR HIS ORGANIZATION ARE WELCOME HERE.

We can get the C.I.A. off the campus, and we can build a movement which will challenge the whole range of the university's complicity with the war. Together, we can win this fight.
