This is the last mailing of its kind which I plan on distributing. I hope that you will find time to read the articles in this mailing and all the others in the red folder. I hope too that you will loan your red folder to other interested people.

In case you may have missed it, we still keep up to date a news clipping bulletin board on events in the South. The board is located to the left of the circular stairway at the entrance to Tresidder Memorial Union.

As you may know our photo display of pictures from the book The Movement was thoroughly defaced while standing in front of Cubberly Auditorium. A very generous Stanford Dean is paying for its repair, and the display will be up again sometime next quarter.

As those of you who read the San Jose Mercury know, we brought John Love, SNCC Project Director for Selma, to Stanford for a much needed two week vacation. I'm sorry that he didn't get a chance to talk to everybody, but there just wasn't time.

The week-long fund raising drive did bring in some money. We sold \$270 worth of books and posters. The profits from these sales go to SNCC. The earmarked donations were as follows: \$57 for Voter Registration, \$25 for Community Centers, \$110 for Freedom Schools, and \$15 for cars. The VR money will pay for mimeograph supplies. The CC money will pay for a radio. The FS money will pay for Negro history books. These supplies will go to the SNCC project in Selma, Alabama. Other donations will help to pay for John Love's vacation.

Recently some friends of mine and I formed a new organization on campus. It is called Stanford Friends of SNCC and Randy Ireson (Toyon) is chairman. I hope that those of you who are really interested in the Movement in the South will work with Randy in support of the work of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee.

There will be a meeting of MFP-S early next quarter; it will be announced in Once Around The Quad in the Daily. We haven't had a meeting in a long time. Please attend.
