Who cannot smile at Youth, Joy and Peace, the theme for the Youth Day at EXPO 67?

August 6 <u>is</u> Hiroshima Day. How could it be otherwise for as long as the impersonal devastation of super-devices remains an instrument of parochial designs? We cannot forget, but for the sake of those who have died we cannot love the less in their name. Youth, Joy and Peace emerge out of these bitter ashes, not a negation but a deep spirit made possible by the deaths of those whose sacrifice is the very condition of our profound humility and humanity.

August 6 -- a Sunday -- is Youth Day at EXPO 67. It is a day for us to allow to emerge from the lessons of history a unity of the spirit of youth, the universality of joy, and the pursuit of peace.

CNVA and the Workshop call upon those who share our spirit to join in a walk -- originally planned by the EXPO Youth Day -- and now our project: a walk from the Canadian border to Montreal. We will cross the border to join others of our youthful spirit who are active in Canadian peace organizations and will walk with them in song, leafleting, talking to persons on our way to EXPO, where we will undertake some sort of creative action to remind fellow youth of the legacy of violence and the need to build upon its lessons.

Among the plans of EXPO for the day are a rally of youth in the main plaza to hear words of peace from Paul Goodman, Julian Bond, Norman Thomas, Thich Nhat Hanh and others. A film festival is also being considered.

we are walking together from champlain, n.y. to montreal, quebec in the spirit of nonviolence, peace, joy, and youth... we believe that non-violence in idea and in practice, is only as strong as our ability to express truth and love directly, in any situation... by our words and actions we mean to call upon persons everywhere NEVER to allow what was done to the cities of Hiroshima and Nagasaki to happen EVER again # # we insist that nuclear and all other means of destruction must be set aside; and that all nations and peoples must learn to settle their disputes outside the fruitless, vicious spiral of violent action and reaction.

anyone who can accept our stated purpose and the following words of caution and information is welcome to join us on this walk.

transportation = several cars are available for rides - if you can provide rides or if you are in need of one, let us know right away - some transportation will be coming from Washington, Philadelphia, and other cities. persons in the New York City area, should come Tuesday eve, 8 pm to 5 Beekman Street (loth floor) office to arrange rides. OR call us at (212) 227-5535

what to bring = specially youthful Tads should bring identification with birthdate and address on it - on re-entry to the US you will be asked (probably) for your draft card; if you do not have it you may be delayed - we will be walking almost the entire time along highway 9, through very flat, warm farmland - comfortable cool clothing, hats for protection from the sun, a good pair of walking shoes, and a rain poncho are necessities - most of us will sleep out in the open, making our meals so sleeping bags, ground cloths, canteen and mess kits, tents, etc are in order o we hope to have a few tents, also arrangements an be made to find nearby motels where needed

cost = other than transportation costs, the only expenses we need have are for the simple meals we will share and small amounts for camping, buses in Montreal, and admission to EXPO '67 - for these very minimal needs, everyone should bring at least \$5 - in order to help out those who have little money and for other personal needs, you ought to bring \$10 or more - remember: it will be difficult to cash cheques so hard cash is muchly preferred

the schedule = we will meet in the small town of Champlain (upper NY 1 mile below the Canadian border) on noon, Thursday of August 3rd - we will meet at the corner of Church and Main Street which is the center of town in front of "city hall!" building - exit 42 on route 87 is best - eating places in Champlain are few so you may want to bring a snack

we will leave the town to cross the Canadian border and walk some 8 miles to camp near Napierville on Thursday evening

Friday we will continue to walk north along 9 to Delson - Saturday morning we will go to a park at the foot of the Cartier Bridge to lunch - persons from Montreal and the Bread and Puppet Theatre of NY! will join us to cross the bridge (with a birds'-eye view of EXPO) and parade thru downtown Montreal to Dominion Square where the living theatre of toronto and the Bread and Puppeteers will perform

Saturday evening we will have a pot-luck buffet with the Hiroshima Day pilgrimage which is bringing money to Canada to purchase medical supplies for all the Vietnamese; this will be at the downtown YMCA - at 7:30 at the YWCA, there will be a meeting for the pilgrimage, including speakers, an exchange of monies, and a showing of "War Games!"

active and Sunday morning at 10 am we will meet again at Dominion Square to walk to EXPO, petitioning the nuclear powers to disarm - to declare peace and to allow the youth of all nations to use their energies for creative, joyful action addressed to the real needs of men... there will be a peace rally afterwards from 2-5 at the Place des Nations in EXPO # # following the rally, we will be on our own to stay at EXPO and see Montreal or to return...

FROM noon, Thursday, August 3rd until we go our ways on Sunday afternoon, we will constitute an ambulatory fishbowl, subject to the scrutiny of both Canadian and U.S. officialdom and probably also to constant -- and , not necessarily benign -- coverage by newspapers, radio, and TV. The appearance of any member of our group will reflect on all of us. Actions od contrary to existing laws, or to the most conventional mores are bound algorto be publicized. Behavior scarcely noticeable amongst individuals, will take on a garish colour. One unthinking violent response, physical or verbal, whatever the provocation, would make us all seem hypo crites; one beer bottle could brand us a bunch of drunkards; any sort of drugs without legal prescription might make the term "pacifist" synonymous with "dope fiend"; and the friendliest newsman cannot be expected to overlook any detail or innuendo of a sexual nature. CNVA therefore asks all walkers to adhere as closely as they are able to the spirit of our spoken and written statements and to do nothing which might reflect discredit on the purpose of this walk.





The Committee for Nonviolent Action and the New York Workshop in Nonviolence ask you to join with us in this walk - originally planned by EXPO Youth Day, and now under our sponsorship.

We will walk from Champlain, N.Y., just below the Canadian border, at noon on Thursday, August 3rd. We will then cross the border to join with Canadians in our walking, our leafleting, our singing, and our meals.

We will arrive in Montreal on Saturday afternoon and will meet in the evening with the Hiroshima Day Pilgrimage that is bringing money to Canada for medical supplies for <u>all</u> the Vietnamese. There will also be peace films and speakers.

On World Youth Day we will walk from downtown Montreal to EXPO 67 where we will engage in a creative action, as a reminder of that legacy of violence to which youth is heir. On this day there will be a large rally for peace in the EXPO Place des Nations. This will include music, poetry, and folk-singing as well as comments by Paul Goodman, William Pepper, Julian Bond, and Thich Nhat Hanh.

The meeting place is Expo 1967, Montreal, Canada; or the alternate place, the New York Hilton Hotel, New York City.

This conference was first proposed by the United

This conference was first proposed by the United Nations General Assembly, November 29, 1965, in its Resolution 2030, approved 112-0. Secretary-General U Thant recognized that, "The proposed world disarmament conference be convened as meeting independent of the world organization (the United Nations)."

The spreading war in Southeast Asia; the unbridled arms race; the continued oppression of peoples by dictators, Communist and non-Communist; the recurring famines of Asia and the extreme poverty of two billions of people growing in further numbers every moment make this conference necessary and urgent.

Existing public and private organizations and individuals have not solved these worsening problems.

Therefore, we are gathering to create a world organization of, by and for the people; to proclaim our oneness and diversity in the Declaration of Interdependence; to prepare to "wage total peace," that is, to reach agreement on "general and complete disarmament" using the enormous savings for world economic development when available; to form at a minimum, an international political party of the free and those who wish to be free; and at best to devise a world public authority deriving its just powers from the consent of the people.

We aspire to become a living community of peace and world citizens; friend to every nation, enemy to none.

United Peoples Day at the New York World's Fair Marked our conception...that event brought messages of approval from United Nations officials, United States Senators, Congressmen and many other interested people!
