Greenwood:

Yesterday morning Morris MacNamara, Jerry DeLuth, kh the Swedish men accompanying them in Greenwood, and Mr. Gary Moore, NCB-TV were all taken to the police station for fingerprinting and photographing. Moore was sent to the SNCC office to tell Bob Weil and Hunter Honey that they too should come down to the station. Neither went, and will not go unless forced to do so by arrest.

There was no picketing in Greenwood yesterday, but 12 people from Itta Bena did go down to register. Picketing will not resume until April 9, which will be a Freedom Day.

This morning Wendy Samstel and Lois Chaffe were arrested in Greenwood. They were driving near the SNCC office with two local Negro men. Police stopped the car and told Wendy he wanted them to come to the jail for photos and fingerprints. Wendy replied that he wouldn't go unless under arrest, so they he and Lois were arrested and taken into the police car. They have not been heard from and we do not know if any charges will be placed on them.

(Wendy and Lois were released without charges: 12:15pm)

Greenwood: Dick Frey

Frey kh asked for and received a continuance in the trial of the fourteen arrested on Tuesday. The trial will be held on Friday at 1:15pm. Frey said that everyone is OK in jail, but they are unable to sleep at night because someone bangs the doors all night. (this is in the city jail. 6 have been moved kh to the county to "prevent overcrowding".

The charges have been changed on the fourteen arrested from disorderly conduct to obstructing public str acts: Miss. Code 2296.5. The maximum sentence for this charge is 6 months and/or \$500.

Mattoon: Sandy Leigh

Henry Bailey 29, Mattoon

On Tuesday night at about midnight Joyce Lerner; Betty Poole, Tougaloo College; Charles Gleam, 33, Mattoon; Mary McGrority, Jackson office; and Laurence Guyot, were stopped in McGea (outside of Jackson). They arrested Bailey who was driving, on charges of improper muffler and improper lights (both lights and muffler were in working order). Bailey was taken into the jail and the others followed. They later left the jail and waited outside while Bailey was trying to place a call to Jackson. While they were waiting the police shut the lights in the jail. Across the street there was a poolroom where a crowd began to gather with chains, etc. The five took the car and began to drive out of town. They were stopped by McGea police and Guyot asked the police to place them in their protective custody until they could contact Jackson. They told the police that they had already been in touch with the Jackson office who had contacted the FBI. Police took them to Neshoba County and put Bailey out on \$54 fine and got other 5 out also.
