In reply to your letter of April 24, 1961, the Postmaster of the Post Office Department, Cleveland, Mississippi has not given me a written official notice of the actions of the Assistant Postmaster General, Bureau of Operation, Washington, D. C. relative to my services. I was told by the Assistant Postmaster here at the Cleveland office of your actions.

Par. 4 of your letter of April 24, inat ask for certain information relative to a particular reported Leave of Absence, whether it was Annual Leave or Sick Leave. The truth of the matter is that I was on Sick Leave when I was requested to come to Washington, D. C. on Friday April 7, 1961. At the time I came to Washington my blood pressure was 240/140 and I was very sick but I had no choice, but I had to get up and get out to hold the 16 hours I had sick or well. I am asking that you please try to get the hours lost by me on May 31, 1958, U.S. Post Office Department, Cleveland, Mississippi back to the old schedule. I know you can if you will. They will accept what ever you reccommend. I am looking for you down to spend a while with me in the summer.
