

Gretchen was jailed twice. She was released both times on bail, once at \$100 and once at \$500. Her parents, Mr and Mrs. John Schwarz of 1358 Franchere Place, put up the bail.

Like others who have returned from Mississippi, Gretchen emphasizes that though the summer is over, the civil rights drive is not.

Of the 800 people who were there this summer, 200 have remained. Many, like Gretchen, plan to return after brief visits home.

"Our goal," she said, "is to work for our own obsolescence."

The long-range program is to establish leadership among the people who live there.

"It's artificial for us to come from outside to push for civil rights," she said.

There are no civil rights workers needed now in at least one town in Mississippi - Ruleville - where local citizens' council has been established to carry on the work.

Gretchen plans to return eventually to school. A political science major, she intends to go through law school.

After that she will go to the South again. " . . . to do something substantial."
