There was one other loose end which I didn't tie up with you. When you asked me to talk to Milly about staying I did, and I never told you what she said. Part of the reason was because I didn't get a chance, but it was also because I wanted to think over what she said. She said that she'd like to stag in the movement, but that she didn't want to have street to work with COFO. COFO, in her works, is intolerant, narrow-minded, pretty much what we're fighting. Her examples were true, although I had never seen them that way, and from her point of view, I really couldn't argue. The conversation ended in a pointless wrangle when I took her up on the proposition that we weren't cooperative with the NAACP. Talking with you about her and with her about "COFO", I had a strange feeling that I was looking at two sides of a coin, and both were perfectly defensible propositions. I could easily understand when you said that she has a superior attitude and I could understand her when she said that COFO is intolerant. I really think though, whatever the official propaganda line is, that she had a pretty constructive experience with us, and made a pretty constructive contribution. And she made several little comments indicating that she thought of the program and in the Dewey St. place in long-range terms, even if she personally is leaving. She made something which she expected to endure, she didn't just put in a month of her time with a bunch of intolerant bigots. If the could trust us to carry on her after-school sessions, she must not hate us that much.

Things are all tore up here in Mt. Idy. You're better off in Waveland. Have a good time. I'm not bothering to send this to Waveland, because you can read it when you get back.
